

Beloved,

Grace and Peace to you in the name of Christ! I give thanks to God for you daily, and pray for your wellbeing and spiritual health. Your faithfulness in being family to one another makes me proud!

Three years ago, I became eligible for a sabbatical, and a congregational vote approved one as part of my Terms of Call. We began making plans, which included applying for a grant from the Lily Foundation Clergy Renewal Program. My mother's death in 2022 derailed our application that year, and we were denied last year. This year, our grant has been approved, and it includes \$15,000 for the congregation for your part of the renewal process. Next summer, while I am away, our congregation will undertake some spiritual work regarding our identity, mission, and where we're heading. Without this grant, we would not have the resources to do this, and I believe it will be very important work.

The theme for my sabbatical is pilgrimage, and I will engage in several activities that involve tending to my own spirit, visiting holy and sacred sites, and reconnecting with family. While you graciously granted me a month away just recently for some much-needed rest, this sabbatical will have an entirely different focus—not just "unplugging" but plugging myself in to a fresh power supply.

When we rejoin at the end of the summer, we will have the opportunity to share with one another what we have each learned—me about myself, and you about our church. I believe that the experience will be a well-timed one, as I celebrate my tenth anniversary with you next November, and as we celebrate 200 years of faithful ministry as a church.

5. **Minimizing Burden**: By distributing the responsibility among many people, it reduces the burden on any single individual or group, preventing burnout and making it more manageable for everyone involved.

Overall, while it might seem like a small detail, having people sign up can significantly enhance the sense of community and smooth operation of church activities.

Please consider signing up once every six months and we'd never be without! Current sign up sheets for Sanctuary Flowers and Refreshments are on the kitchen refrigerator.







CONGREGATIONAL FELLOWSHIP

In this New York Times bestseller, the author brings to life the story of the building of the transcontinental railroad. It is a story of the men who built the railroad: the investors who risked their money; the engineers and surveyors who risked their lives; and, most importantly, the Chinese and Irish immigrants and former Confederate soldiers who did the backbreaking work of laying the tracks. Through Ambrose's words, this huge undertaking comes alive.






ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Bible Sunday School class continues to meet via ZOOM. This conveniently allows us to study and learn in an informal manner from the comfort of our home computer, on a tablet or



There are ten changes that the General Assembly 226 adopted that are listed on the handouts available in the Narthex. We continue to highlight a few each month. **Medical coverage, small church flexibility** GAEC-28 asks mid councils to work with the Board of Pensions to explore adjustments to be made to medical dues plans for Pastors and Spouse or Families to **help alleviate the burden on small congregations and present medical coverage options** for pastoral leaders needing family, spousal, or child coverage in 2026 and beyond. GA unanimously agreed to develop educational resources for faith formation for congregational use and to meet the needs of the small church.

Divestment from occupier countries

GA unanimously adopted a commissioner's resolution asking The Presbyterian Foundation and the Board of Pensions, the two primary investing arms of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), to "prayerfully consider" ending their investments in government debt from countries "engaged in prolonged military occupation," currently defined by the United Nations as Israel, Morocco and Turkey.

Protecting children from gun violence

DOE-03, an overture calling for action so that children can live free from gun violence, passed easily in committee but was removed from the consent agenda so the entire assembly could hear testimony about it. Following heart-wrenching witness, co-moderator Tony Larson spoke and said, "The stories are important, but they are hard. They are important because they have residence in our communities." DOE-03 passed the assembly unanimously.




TREASURER'S CORNER


