Beloved,

Grace and peace in the name of our newborn Christ! As always, I pray for each of you and give thanks to God for the work and witness we do.

As I begin my tenth year with you, I have spent some time reflecting on the work God has given me to do with you. When I arrived, there was a great deal of pessimism about the future of this church, particularly as there had been a cycle of pastors who came and went a couple of years at a time. And honestly, my first couple of years, I was also discouraged and wondered if this was truly where God wanted me. Reflecting on the discernment process involved in bringing me to this congregation, and spending much time in prayer, God affirmed that I did indeed have good work to do with you. So I spent the first several years working on building our spiritual health, striving to banish that pessimism, and find a new boldness in our ministry. We were just about getting there when Covid hit. My God-given work shifted to figuring out how we could still be church together despite being apart. Navigating technology, learning new skills, enlisting members to act as deacons to call you on a regular basis, brainstorming ways to remind folks that they were still a part of a loving church family.

In the years since then, God's work for me has been oriented to rebuilding our church structure and procedures. This has, admittedly, been slow work. And of course, the loss of my mother in 2022 was a heartache that has made my work more difficult. These last few years in particular have taken a heavy toll on my spirit. I look forward to my coming sabbatical and pilgrimage to renew my spirit so that I may come back to you a better pastor with fresh energy and imagination as we prepare to celebrate our 200th Anniversary next year.

Thank you for your grace, compassion, and willingness to do God's work in this time and place. I beg that you hold me in your prayers as I hold you in mine.

May God bless you—and our church family—deeply in the New Year.








After-Worship Receptions:

The First Presbyterian Book Club will meet Thursday January 9th at 2:00 pm in the church parlor. We will be discussing John Lewis: A Life by David Greenburg. Greenberg has written a comprehensive biography of the Civil Rights icon, John Lewis, drawing on interviews with Lewis and others who knew him at various stages of his life.

Born into poverty in rural Alabama, Lewis became second only to Martin Luther King, Jr. in his contributions to the Civil Rights movement. His heroism during this time helped to bring America a new birth of freedom.

The book selection for February is *Baron's: Money, Power, and the Corruption of America's Food Industry* by Austin Frerick. This book is the number one best seller on the topics of agriculture and food policy. Frerick reveals the ill-gained strangle hold that a hand full of companies have on America's food economy. These stories are examples of the monopolies and corruption that define today's American food industry. These companies have manipulated our tax laws for their own benefit to the detriment of our neighborhoods, livelihoods and our democracy itself. The author paints a stark portrait of the consequences of corporate consolidation and greed, but he also shows how we can take a different path in the future.

Samaritan Ministry

We had a group of 7 families come for assistance this month and we helped them all keep their utilities on through the generous gifts you have given to the Samaritan Ministry. Joel Burns graciously stepped up to help when Bill was unavailable this

month. But Bill works hard on this ministry each month and could use a partner to help. With the weather turning cold, we expect more people to need help with their utilities.

The next disbursement of funds will be on Tuesday, January 21 at 9:30 AM.

During the first 3 weeks of December, Food Pantry served 38 households, 18 on one day (4 of them new). We had prepared holiday dinner bags before Thanksgiving as an option that week and held the unclaimed ones for Christmas. They were taken by several folks after the "regular" ones were all distributed, hence



the 18 on Dec. 17th. We still ran out in 15 minutes! We did distribute on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, serving 11 more families (2 of them new), because the need does not take a holiday. Thank you for your generous support of this ministry; so very many families depend upon it, as shown by that total of 49 this month. Keep your contributions and your prayers coming! My thanks to Pat and Sherry Henry who helped on December 31 and will manage in my absence January 7. ~Donna




ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL




WEDNESDAY NIGHT STUDY




TREASURER'S CORNER



group. The youth group saw her final performance on Sunday, December 15 and were blown away.





Any reflection on the work of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. DR. MARTIN LUTHER calls into view particular gifts of his ministry: the application of the gospel to political and social reform; the coupling of cries for justice with public action; and the merger of passion and intellect. Dr. King, like preachers before him, focused on agape. However, he was radical enough to merge the themes of grace and justice.

He brought to the pulpit a social gospel that defined racism as a theological issue and promoted active agape love as a power that could bring political transformation to a nation steeped in discriminatory practice and ideology. In the early 60's, many of us saw King as representing a new breed of preachers. My exposure to the church had provided a limited view of the black preacher as someone who only interpreted the gospel as a promise of salvation in the "bye and bye." Dr. King wasn't the first, but he was the most prominent symbol of a person who brought together themes of the black church tradition (emphasis on justice and hope) with the universalism of the gospel (God has created all people equal) in a style that affirmed both the passion of black preaching and the astuteness of theological training. Certainly people who preceded him and many of his contemporaries fit that mold, however they were not as visible to the masses. Dr. King launched, through the help of television, the times and his being deemed the leader of the civil rights movement. an appreciation in the (sic) populous for a different image of the "black preacher." His incorporation of a social gospel, a passionate call for political involvement, with a wellgrounded theological perspective is still an influential model of ministry within the African American Christian community and beyond.
