Grace and peace to you in the name of our Risen Lord Jesus Christ! I lift you up in prayer before our loving and gracious God and give thanks for you, your faith, and the good work that we do together in Christ's name.

June is Pride Month--a month dedicated to learning the history of the LGBTQ+ civil rights movement, to celebrate the wondrous diversity of humanity, and to show support for those in our midst who may have experienced hurtful and even deadly attitudes and behaviors from family and strangers alike.

It is important for the church to acknowledge its own role in perpetuating harm. For many Christians, attempts to seek guidance in scripture have been conflated with secular bigotry, resulting in a less-loving church misaligned with the encompassing love of our Savior. It is difficult to estimate the number of LGBTQ+ individuals who have been shunned by church and family, subjected to hate crime, and lost their lives by their own hand or others' because of things taught in church. Pride Month is the time for us to name the church's sins against LGBTQ+ persons, repent of our bigoted and harmful past, and to reaffirm our trust that God has indeed made each of us beautifully and wonderfully.




That's how many years old our congregation will be in 2026!

The First Presbyterian Book Club will hold the June meeting on Thursday June 13th in the church parlor at 2:00 pm. The book selection that we will be discussing for June is Material World; The Six Raw Materials That Shape Modern Civilization by Ed Conway. In his book the author explains how the fundamental materials sand, salt, iron, copper, oil and lithium have created

empires, razed civilizations and fed our ingenuity and greed for thousands of years. Without them, our modern world would not exist, and the battle to control them will determine our future. One example is sand. Without sand there would be no concrete, and without concrete there would be no high rise buildings. The Romans developed the formula for concrete and used concrete extensively in their building. The formula was lost when the Roman Empire fell, and it was centuries before the correct combination of materials was combined again to make a usable form of concrete.

The book selection for July is *The Black Box: Writing the Race* by Henry Louis Gates, Jr. Dr. Gates is a well known professor of Black History, but most people know him as the host for the PBS series "Finding Your Roots". Distilled over many years from his Harvard introductory course in African American Studies, this book is the story of Black self- definition described through the work of Black writers over many decades from Phillis Wheatley and Frederick Douglass to more modern writers Richard Wright, James Baldwin and Toni Morrison. Through their essays, speeches, novels, plays, and poems, a long line of creative thinkers have shown the rest of the world the contours of the black box inside which society has assigned this "nation within a nation" to live.

Please join us this month for a discussion of *Material World*. It is an interesting book that will cause you to rethink your ideas about simple materials that we see and use everyday. ~Millie Murphy


As the weather gets warmer, frozen bottles of water for the Free Fridge are always welcome. **Thank you!**




CHRISTIAN EDUCATION


